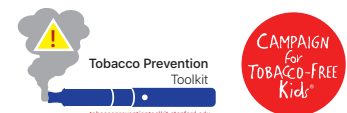

# International Leadership Conference Guest Speakers

## Vice Admiral Jerome M. Adams, M.D., M.P.H. U.S. Surgeon General

HOSA-Future Health Professionals is honored to have Vice Admiral (VADM) Jerome M. Adams, M.D., M.P.H., Surgeon General of the United States, to provide remarks at the 41st International Leadership Conference in Dallas, Texas.

Jerome M. Adams, MD, MPH, the 20th Surgeon General of the United States, was sworn into office by Vice President Mike Pence on September 5, 2017. Dr. Adams, a board-certified anesthesiologist, served as Indiana State Health Commissioner from 2014 to 2017. Dr. Adams, a Maryland native, has bachelor's degrees in both biochemistry and psychology from the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, a master of public health degree from the University of California at Berkeley, and a medical degree from Indiana University School of Medicine.

Dr. Adams was also an associate professor of clinical anesthesia at Indiana University School of Medicine and a staff anesthesiologist at Eskenazi Health, where he was Chair of the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee. He has served in leadership positions at a number of professional organizations, including the American Medical Association, the Indiana State Medical Association and the Indiana Society of Anesthesiologists. He is the immediate past Chair of the Professional Diversity Committee for the American Society of Anesthesiologists.

As Health Commissioner, Dr. Adams presided over Indiana's efforts to deal with the state's unprecedented HIV outbreak. In this capacity, he worked directly with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, as well as with state and local health officials and community leaders, and brought the widest range of resources, policies and care available to stem the epidemic affecting that community.

He also helped with the successful launch of Indiana's state-based, consumer-driven alternative to Medicaid expansion and worked with the state legislature to secure more than \$10 million to combat infant mortality in high-risk areas of the state.

Dr. Adams' motto as Surgeon General is "better health through better partnerships." As Surgeon General, Dr. Adams is committed to maintaining strong relationships with the public health community and forging new partnerships with non-traditional partners, including business and law enforcement.

He has pledged to lead with science, facilitate locally led solutions to the nation's most difficult health problems, and deliver higher quality healthcare at lower cost through patient and community engagement and better prevention.

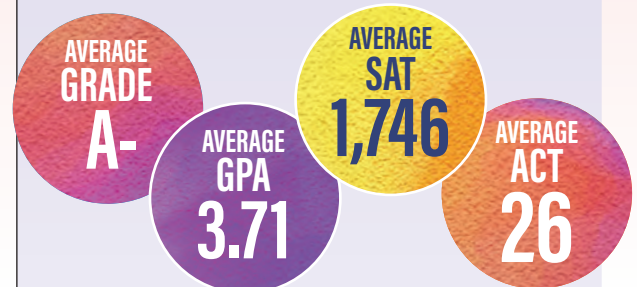

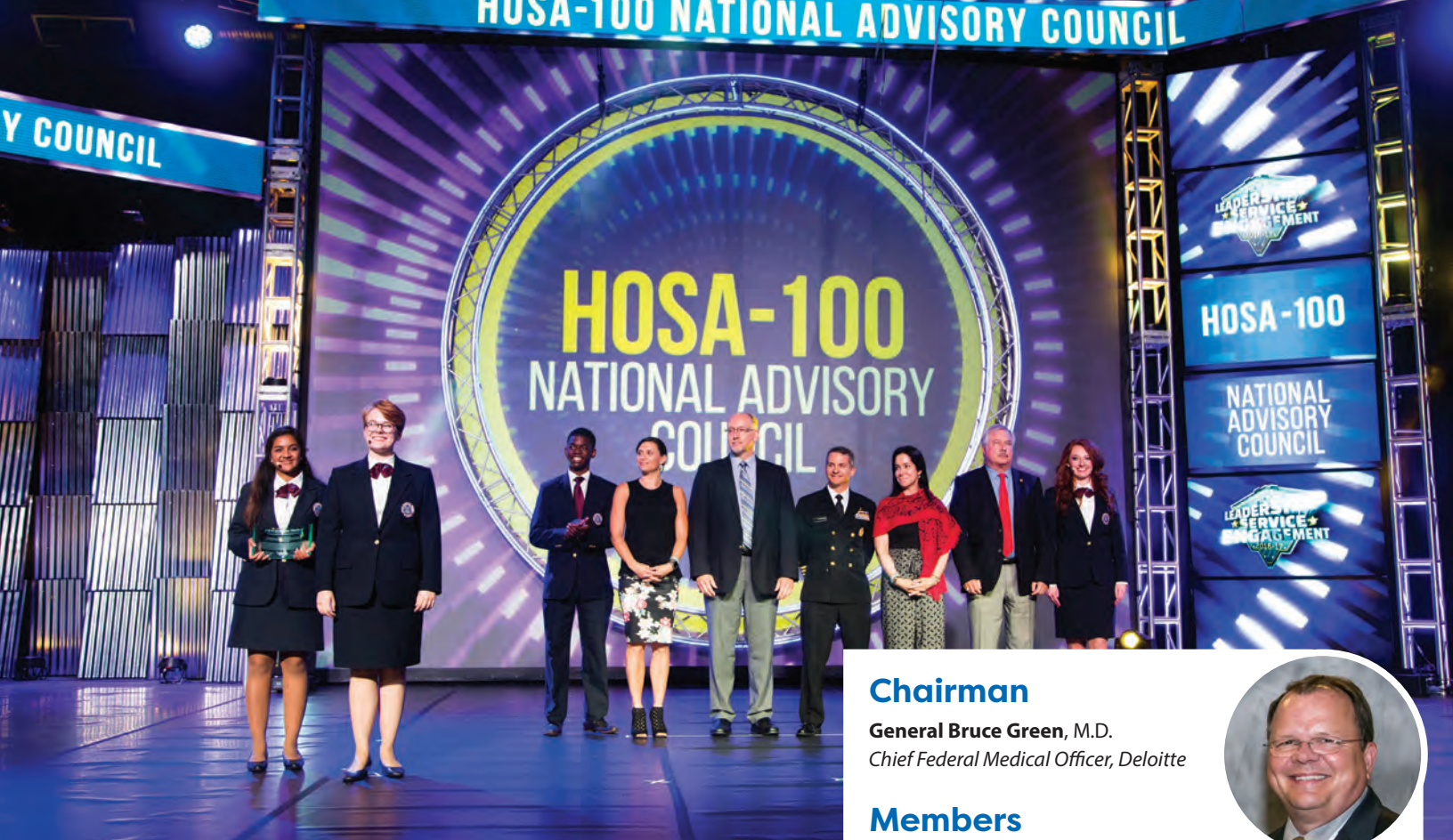

### USUHS - HOSA Partner

The Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) is the nation's federal health professions academy — akin to the undergraduate programs of the U.S. military academies at West Point, Annapolis and Colorado Springs. And like the academies, students are not charged tuition; they repay the nation for their education through service. In many respects, USUHS's curricula and educational experiences are similar to those of civilian academic health centers, with one important difference: its emphasis on military health care, leadership, readiness and public health set USUHS apart.

For the past eight years, USUHS has been an integral part of HOSA's Washington Leadership Academy as a sponsor of HOSA's health industry tours to their campus and Walter Reed. In addition, USUHS staff members have continually been involved with HOSA's International Leadership Conference as exhibitors, workshop presenters, and scholarship sponsors.

Joan Stearman, Director of Admissions, USUHS, serves as USUHS' liaison for HOSA's WLA and regularly attends HOSA's ideas meetings and connects new members to HOSA. 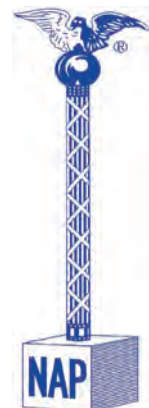
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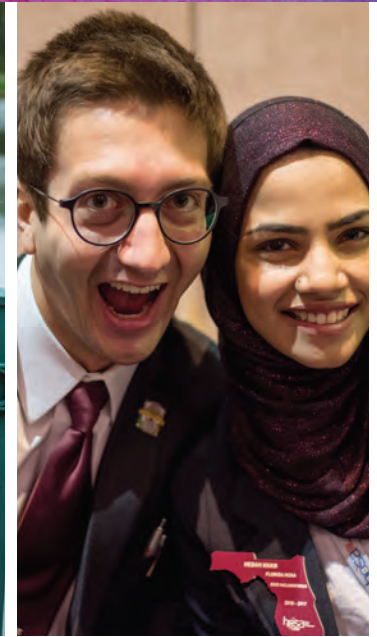


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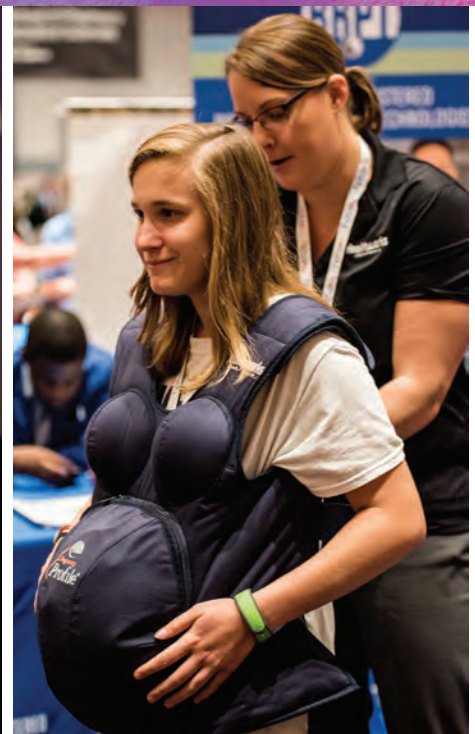

# 2018 Conference Information

## Hotel Property

Conduct at any HOSA function, whether it is a general session or in the cleanliness of a sleeping room, should make a positive contribution to the reputation of HOSA. Advisors should check rooms before departure from the hotel to ensure that they are left in good condition. Delegates are responsible for any vandalism to hotel rooms or property and will be expected to pay any and all damages incurred.

## Conference Name Badges

Conference name badges must be worn at all times. For conference activities, wear your name badge in plain sight to ensure your admittance to conference functions. The name badge serves as the entry to all official conference functions including general sessions, business session, workshops, and for bus transportation to competitive event sites. Name badges are vital to HOSA's ILC Security Plan. **No name badge, no admission to ILC functions.** For security purposes, do not wear the conference badge while touring the city. Replacement badges are \$5 and can be obtained at the ILC Headquarters with proper identification.

## General Sessions

## Educational Symposium and Workshops

Your conference name badge will serve as your admission ticket to all Educational Symposiums and entertainment activities. Please remember that seating for Educational Symposiums is on a first-come, first-served basis while space is available.

## Local and State Advisors' Orientation Meeting

All local and state advisors are encouraged to attend the orientation meeting on Wednesday. All conference chairmen will be present. Any changes in the program will be given at this time. This orientation is provided to ensure a smooth-running competitive events program and conference. In addition, first-time advisors are invited to participate in the Newcomers Coffee Talk on Wednesday morning.

## Voting Delegates

Each Voting Delegate will receive a Voting Delegate ribbon from his/her State Advisor. All Voting Delegates are **required** to attend the Voting Delegate Activities including the Wednesday Briefing (1–4 P.M.), Meet the Candidates Session on Thursday (9–11:30 A.M.) and the Business Session on Friday (8:30–11 A.M.). Voting Delegates should be seated in the Voting Delegate area at least ten minutes prior to the start of the Business Session. Official HOSA Uniform or blue or black suit must be worn. Voting Delegates should also bring a mobile device (i.e. smartphone or tablet) to participate in the eVoting ballot.

### Executive Council Campaigning

Verbal campaigning may begin after the officer candidate slate is announced by the Nominating Committee. All conference delegates are invited to meet the candidates during the Open Forum on Thursday from 11:30 A.M. – 12:30 P.M.

### Reproduction of Photographs

As a delegate to the International Leadership Conference, permission is granted to make photographs, videotapes, broadcasts, and/or sound recordings, separately or in combination, available for reproduction for educational and promotional purposes by HOSA unless you put in writing this exception.

### Competitive Events Information

Sixty competitive events will be conducted in six program areas at Secondary and Postsecondary/Collegiate levels and fifteen competitive events at the Middle School level at the International Leadership Conference. HOSA competitive events are conducted as incentives for students to be recognized for achievement related to career and leadership development. Competitive events are designed to complement the health and biomedical science education programs through application of the instruction received. This practical experience assists the HOSA member in developing the knowledge, skills, and attitude required to deliver quality healthcare.

### Orientation and Scheduling

Competitor Orientations will take place directly before the round one event. There will **not** be time between the Orientation and the start of the event to go back to your room. Competitors must bring all items for their competition to the orientation and be properly dressed, as their appointment time may be immediately following orientation.

### Random Appointment Assignment

If you are in an event with appointment times, this means the first appointment times will be immediately following the conclusion of Orientation. You may be the first to report, or you may be two hours later, depending on your random appointment assignment. You should prepare for both possibilities.

### Round Two Information Sheets

Round Two Information Sheets have been created for competitors who advance to Round Two. These Round Two Information Sheets are one-page documents that explain all the details of round two, what to expect, where to go, and any special notes needed. Round Two Info Sheets will be posted on the HOSA app and available in CE Headquarters.


### Event Personnel Meeting Timing

Event Personnel Meetings will take place directly before the Round One event starts, instead of at an earlier time or day. There will be a second Event Personnel Meeting that takes place directly before the Round Two portion of the event, if applicable.

### Competitive Event Judges

Competitive event judges are asked to arrive at the Judge Orientation for their event. It should be remembered that event judges are “very important persons” at the International Leadership Conference. ## HOSA ILC Conduct Code

A good reputation enables members to take pride in their organization. HOSA members have an excellent reputation. Your conduct at any HOSA function should make a positive contribution to the reputation already established.

1. Your behavior at all times should be such that it reflects credit to you, your school/college, your state and HOSA. Members shall refrain from using inappropriate or profane language at all times. Members shall refrain from verbal, physical or sexual harassment, hazing or name-calling.
2. Student conduct is the responsibility of the local chapter advisor or chaperone. Students shall keep their advisors informed of their activities and whereabouts at all times.
3. HOSA Conference name badges shall be worn at all times at HOSA functions. You are expected to attend all general sessions and other scheduled conference activities. Please be prompt and show respect to those in the audience and on stage.
4. Members are to report any accidents, injuries or illnesses to their local chapter or state advisor immediately.
5. Members are expected to observe the designated curfew. (Curfew means that each person must be in their room by the designated hour.)
6. If a student is responsible for stealing or vandalism, the student and his/her parents will be expected to pay any and all damages.
7. Members/participants attending the International Leadership Conference may not purchase, consume or be under the influence of alcohol or drugs at any time. Violators will be subject to stringent disciplinary action.
8. The International Leadership Conference is a non-smoking conference.
9. Students who disregard the rules will be subject to disciplinary action and will be sent home at their own expense. Parents will be notified.
10. Any long distance phone calls, charges to the room, etc. will be the responsibility of the individual student and/or parents.
11. Members are to abide by the ILC Attire Policy at all business sessions, general sessions, competitive events and other Conference activities.
12. As a delegate to the International Leadership Conference, permission is granted to make photographs, videotapes, broadcasts, and/or sound recordings, separately or in combination, available for reproduction for educational and promotional purposes by HOSA, Inc.

**GENERAL SESSION PROTOCOL:** The general sessions should be enthusiastic but delegates must not be rude or obnoxious to those in the audience or on stage. It is important to remain seated until the end of the session. States that do not adhere to general session protocol will be asked to send a representative to a special meeting of the HOSA Executive Council.





## Official HOSA Uniform and Dress Code Policy

**The dress code will be strictly enforced for all general sessions. Student delegates not adhering to the dress code will not be admitted to the general sessions. NOTE: This policy is for student delegates. Advisors, family members, and guests are not required to wear the HOSA uniform or the black or navy blue suit with a white shirt to the general sessions but are asked to be professionally dressed.**

### Official HOSA Uniform Policy:

- Tailored navy blazer with emblem affixed over the heart.
- Matching navy slacks or navy knee-length skirt
- White, closed-neck, tailored dress shirt suitable for tie or scarf
- Accents: maroon HOSA scarf or maroon long tie
- Closed-toe blue or black shoes (hose optional)
- Belt (blue or black)
- Head covers that are required for religious purposes or to honor cultural tradition are allowed.

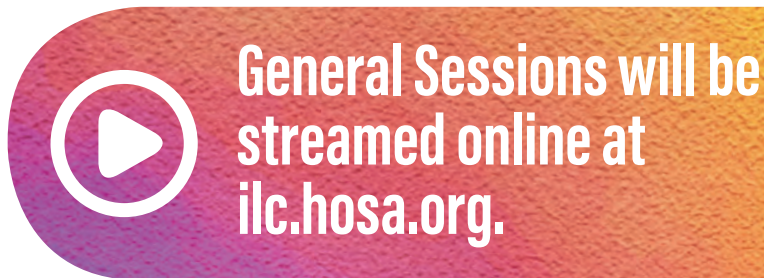
### Non-uniform Alternative:

- Black or navy blue suit
- White, closed-neck, tailored dress shirt suitable for tie or ascot/scarf
- White blouse (can be member's choice)
- Accents: maroon HOSA scarf or maroon or navy long tie
- Members may choose to wear knee-length skirt or slacks
- Closed-toe blue or black shoes (hose optional)
- Belt (blue or black)
- Head covers that are required for religious purposes or to honor cultural tradition are allowed.

### Competitive Event's Dress Attire:

Delegates must adhere to the policy as specified in the individual competitive event guidelines for the orientation and event in which they are competing. For proper business attire, appropriate clinical attire or unacceptable attire, read carefully Appendix E, Section B of the HOSA Handbook.

HOSA members should dress appropriately, based on the Official Dress standards outlined for the gender to which they identify.
